Panel Descriptions

Connecting to Community: Meeting Health-Related Social Needs During Reentry

Description: Guidance from the Centers for Medicaid and Medicare Services requires any
demonstration to include case management and the connection of patients with Health-Related
Social Needs (HRSN) services upon reentry. Panelists will discuss the unique HRSN of people who
have been involved with the criminal justice system, what will be required to successfully meet
their needs during reentry from a carceral facility, and how to capitalize on the other policy tools
increasing access to HRSN.

Involving the People Most Impacted in Program Design

Description: The people who will be impacted by the successes and failures of these programs
are people in jails and prisons, and their communities. This principle was reaffirmed in the
passing of the SUPPORT Act as well as the subsequent guidance from CMS on waivers for prerelease coverage. Yet there remain calls for better engagement of stakeholders who have
experienced these carceral facilities. This panel will discuss best practices for the involvement of
people with lived experience, and why this must be a core component of any waiver.

Cross-Sector Collaboration: Breaking Silos and Building Bridges

• Description: CMS has made clear that building better relationships across reentry stakeholders must be a core component of waiver programs. This panel will focus on the importance of having a broad and diverse group of advisory members which incorporate the perspectives of CBOs, MCOs, carceral representatives, and health care providers.

Disrupting Roads to Incarceration Through Reinvestment in Health

• Description: The lion share of these waivers will seek to bolster the reentry system and facilitate better health outcomes as someone is released from a carceral facility, but they also present the opportunity to "reinvest" funds into state initiatives that assist in preventing incarceration—a promising opportunity to focus funding on programs that disrupt the increased risk of incarceration for marginalized communities. These panelists will discuss efforts to decrease reliance on the carceral system by utilizing health-based interventions.
